FAQ

Is Nevada SkillsMatch a job board like Indeed or Monster? Nevada SkillsMatch is not a job board, but it can connect you to local jobs that you may be a good fit for. Nevada SkillsMatch is a tool that allows you to understand career and education opportunities that may be a good fit for you given your past experience.

Do I need to create a login to start using Nevada SkillsMatch? No, Nevada SkillsMatch can be accessed anywhere by anyone and you don't have to create a login to use the tool. It is recommended, however, that you create a login in the top right corner to save your results and come back later.

How much does Nevada SkillsMatch cost to use? Nevada SkillsMatch is a completely free tool to utilize. The Governor's Office of Nevada partnered with the Nevada Office of Workforce Innovation to fund and provide Nevada SkillsMatch to jobseekers across the state.

About this initiative

Nevada SkillsMatch is an initiative of the Governor's Office of Economic Development (GOED) and the Office of Workforce Innovation (OWINN) to use the language of skills to connect workers displaced by the pandemic with training or job opportunities based on their skills.

To do this, GOED and OWINN are working closely with Emsi, a labor market analytics firm, the university and community college systems, and local workforce boards, to develop a skills-based approach when serving jobseekers.
