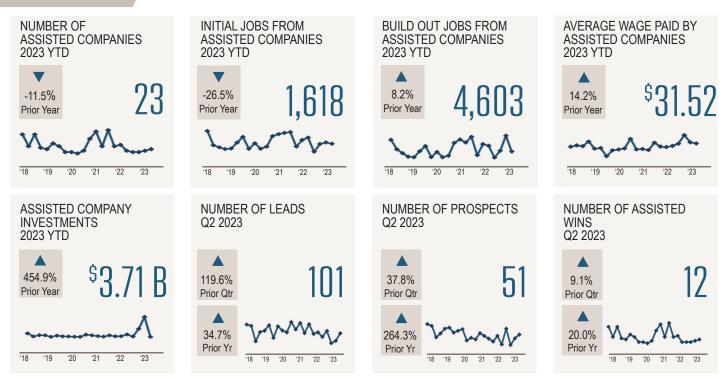
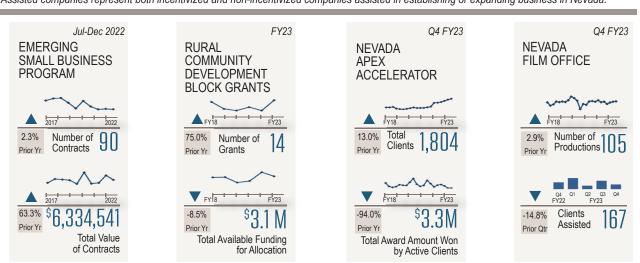

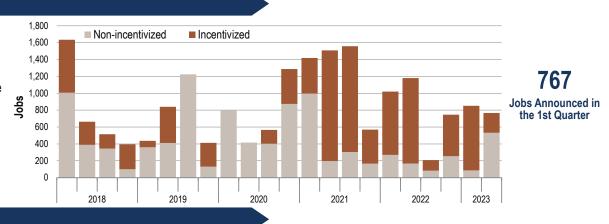
Assisted companies represent both incentivized and non-incentivized companies assisted in establishing or expanding business in Nevada.

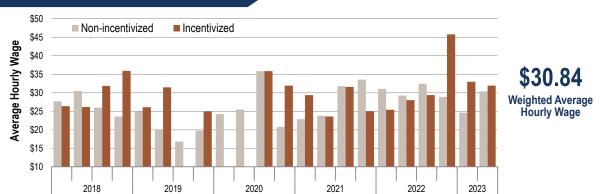
JOBS ANNOUNCED BY ASSISTED COMPANIES

In the second quarter of 2023, twelve companies committed to adding 767 jobs to Nevada's economy in the next two years. Once these companies are fully staffed, the build-out job estimate is 1,337. Incentivized companies are bringing in 235 jobs, while non-incentivized assisted companies are adding 532 jobs to the workforce.



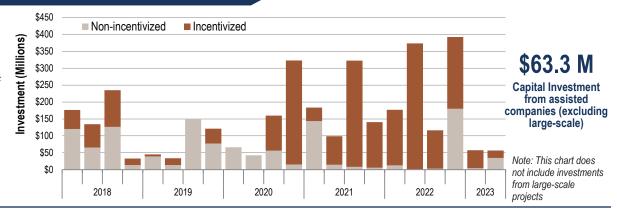
WAGES PAID BY ASSISTED COMPANIES

The average hourly wage paid by all assisted companies came in at \$30.84 in the second quarter of 2023, up 9.5 percent from the \$28.17 reported for the second quarter of 2022. In the second quarter, average wages from incentivized companies were \$31.91 while non-incentivized companies had average wages of \$30.37 per hour.



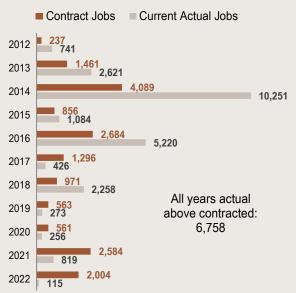
CAPITAL INVESTMENT BY ASSISTED COMPANIES

Capital investment by assisted companies (excluding large-scale projects*) totaled \$56.8 million in the first quarter, \$22.2 million of which is attributed to incentivized companies.



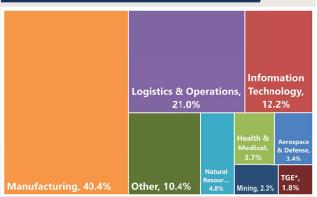

CONTRACT AND ACTUAL JOBS BY NEW INCENTIVIZED COMPANIES



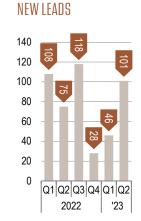
As new incentivized companies establish and grow, the number of actual jobs has exceeded those that were contracted at the time abatements were approved.

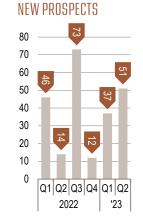
ASSISTED COMPANY INDUSTRY MIX 2012-2023:Q2, by Number of Companies

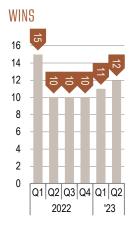

RECRUITMENT ACTIVITY: 2022Q1 -2023Q2

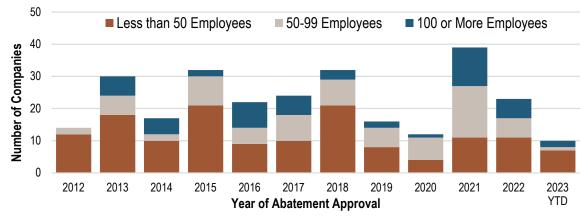






There were 12 wins in the second quarter of 2023. This marks a 9.1 percent increase from the first quarter, and a twenty percent increase from the second quarter of 2022. When compared to the previous quarter, new leads were up by 119.6 percent and prospects grew by 37.8 percent. When compared to a year ago, leads are up 34.7 percent and prospects are up 264.3 percent.

ABATED COMPANIES BY SIZE CLASS

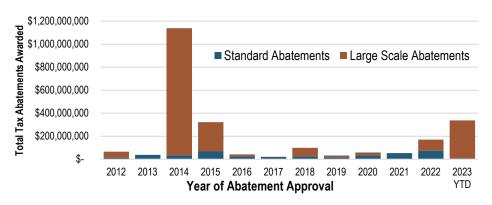


Of the 271 companies that have been abated since 2012 (across all abatement types, excluding withdrawn and noncompliant), more than 52 percent have had fewer than 50 employees within two years of operation. For the ten companies abated so far in 2023, seven plan to have fewer than 50 employees in two years.

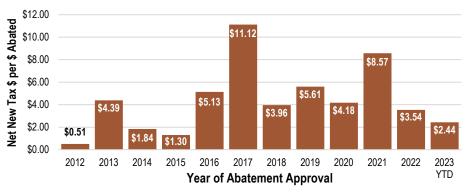

NEVADA APEX ACCELERATOR

OVERVIEW FY2023 04

- » During the fourth quarter, Nevada APEX Accelerator (former Nevada Procurement Technical Assistance Center or PTAC) clients were awarded 114 prime contracts, bringing the fiscal year total to 951 prime contracts with an average award of \$126,804. The number of active clients increased to 1,804 during the quarter, bringing the state fiscal year average to 1,724.
- » The APEX Accelerator division continues to teach and provide one-on-one counseling sessions as clients pursue local, state, and federal government-related contracts and subcontracts. Counseling, in part, includes help with solicitation document review, draft proposal review, and contract administration guidance. The APEX Accelerator also provides no-charge outreach events such as webinars.

EMERGING SMALL BUSINESS PROGRAM OVFRVIFW

- » The number of Emerging Small Businesses (ESB's) certified in the second half of calendar year 2022 increased by 99.2 percent from the same period last year, and 15.5 percent when compared to the first half of the year. The total number of ESBs that have been certified since 2014 now stands at 2,330.
- The average contract amount in the second half of 2022 was \$70,384; up 59.6 percent from the second half of 2021 and down 29.9 percent from the first half of 2022.

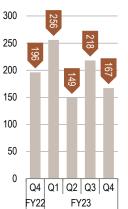

RURAL GRANT PROGRESS, FY2023 02

- » During the fourth quarter (April through June), \$354,170 was paid to seven rural cities. For the CDBG-Covid program \$2,665,822 was paid to six communities.
- » CDBG staff did not close any grants this period.
- There are currently 49 open grants. For the standard CDBG program, there are two grants from 2018, one grant from 2019, three grants from 2020, 10 grants from 2021, and 16 grants from 2022. For the CDBG-CV program, there are 17 open grants from 2020.

URBAN COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANTS. FY2023 02

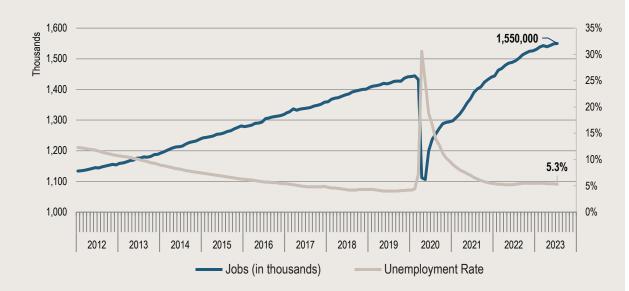
- » During the fourth quarter (April through June), \$21,386 was paid to Carson City.
- » Carson City received \$482,788 in the HUD allocation to fund three projects for program year 2022.
- » In 2023, Carson City's program reverted back to the entitlement program. Carson City has nine open grants with the State CDBG program that will close June 2024. State CDBG staff will continue to report on the nine open grants.

Notes: Federal Program Year 2022 corresponds to State Fiscal Year 2023 (July 2022 through June 2023). Total Allocation includes HUD allocation as well as recaptured funds from previous years.

NEVADA JOBS AND UNEMPLOYMENT

Nevada recorded 1,550,000 jobs in July, a gain of 3.8 percent from the prior year. The most recent figures represent a gain of 105,800 jobs over the pre-pandemic high. Nationally, employment grew just 2.2 percent over the year in July.

Nevada's unemployment rate stood at 5.3 percent in July, down a tenth of a percentage point from the prior month to reach the same rate as July of 2022. Rising labor force participation suggests that more Nevadans are returning to the workforce, which puts upward pressure on the unemployment rate as they search for work.



ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT TARGET SECTORS: REALIZING NEVADA'S ELECTRIC, INNOVATIVE, AND CONNECTED FUTURE

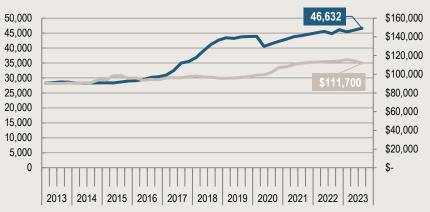
In March 2023, GOED released its new 5-Year Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy, titled "Realizing Nevada's Electric, Innovative, and Connected Future". Together with this report, GOED worked with SRI International's Center for Innovation Strategy and Policy to develop updated target industry sectors to take Nevada into the future.

Among these are five primary economic development target sectors:

- » Advanced Manufacturing
- » Transportation & Logistics
- » Information Technology
- » Natural Resources & Technology
- » Hospitality, Tourism, Sports, & Creative Industries

ADVANCED MANUFACTURING



Advanced manufacturing job estimates grew by 578 in the third quarter, with 46,632 jobs in the State. Average annual earnings (measured as wages, salaries, and proprietor earnings, as well as benefits) amounted to \$111,700 in the third quarter, down slightly from second quarter estimates and down two percent from the prior year.

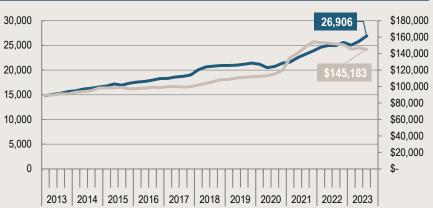
TRANSPORTATION & LOGISTICS



Nevada's transportation and logistics sector grew by 1.5 percent over the quarter and 7.6 percent (or 8,000) jobs over the year to reach total employment of 114,786. Average annual earnings in this sector increased by two percent over the year to reach \$74,521.

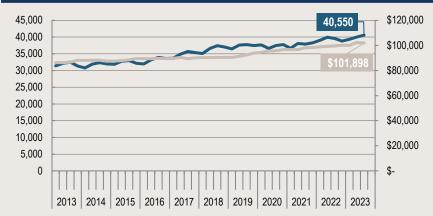
INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY



The information technology sector added almost 2,000 jobs over the year (a gain of 7.9 percent) and 1,000 jobs from the prior quarter, with a total of 26,906. Average annual earnings were down 4.3 percent over the year but still remain higher than other target sectors, at \$145,183.

NATURAL RESOURCES & TECHNOLOGY



Nevada's natural resources and technology sector added 577 jobs in the third quarter and expanded 2.5 percent over the year to reach 40,550 jobs statewide. Average annual earnings were up 2.2 percent over the year and about flat over the quarter at \$101,898.

HOSPITALITY, TOURISM, SPORTS, & CREATIVE INDUSTRIES



Employment across hospitality, tourism, sports and creative industries reached a new post-pandemic high at 416,580 jobs reported in the third quarter, up 3.7 percent from last year and two percent from the prior quarter. Average annual earnings increased by a strong 5.6 percent from last year, at \$53,291.
